Department Chair (2006 – 2015)

Completed three 3-year terms as department chair. The first term was in the College of Health and Human Performance (CHHP) and the second two in the Marriott School of Business after the CHHP was disbanded and our department was moved to the business school.

Successfully guided the department through the transition to and integration with the Marriott School of Business. As part of the transition, led faculty in a strategic planning process and major curriculum change resulting in a new department name. The department name change at that time was to Recreation Management, with a program name change within the department from Leisure Services Management to Experience Industry Management.

Worked very closely with college deans during the transition years and built strong relationships with them.

Developed an effective approach to assessing program level learning outcomes to meet professional and university accreditation standards. The process led to productive curriculum discussions and improvement.

Completed managerial functions such as determining budget priorities, conducting annual faculty reviews, evaluating administrative staff I supervised, seeking internal funding to support faculty research and travel, advocating for department priorities, and supporting the mission of the college and university.
